#### **Overview**

This project focused on water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) programs in the troubled Rahkine State in north-western Myanmar. Working with experienced partners, this project has been delayed due to various factors, including civil unrest that has raged in the area for the past 18 months, together with lockdowns due to COVID-19. The target area relocated to Manaung Island, off the Rakhine coast in the most poverty-stricken region in the State with 70,000 inhabitants. Strong community engagement has ensured villagers can maintain and make filters, understand the benefits of clean water, appoint local facilitators and receive WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene) training.

construct 173 biosand filters Villagers were assisted to make 173 bio-sand filters to provide clean water for families across 8 villages, together with training and the appointment of local facilitators to oversee their production, use and maintenance.





clean water for 1737 people 1737 people have access to clean water in villages that have never had clean water! Each family contributed a small amount to assist strong buy-in. These funds are being pooled to allow other families to access a filter and training.



#### Shwe Nu's family life transformed!

"My village has always drunk unclean water from the pond. There was no other option. As a result, so many people are sick all the time and some die every year. Some old people say that we are being punished by evil spirits. We have little money to go to the village health clinic every time we get sick. My family has helped make a bio-sand filter and we now have clean water! No-one from my family has been sick from water since then. We have been trained in how to use the filter and the villagers are using it with confidence. We are grateful. This really is life-saving water!"
